

THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

Celebrant The Lord be with you. **People** And also with you.

Celebrant Let us pray.

Almighty Father, whose dear Son, on the night before he suffered, instituted the Sacrament of his Body and Blood: Mercifully grant that we may receive it thankfully in remembrance of Jesus Christ our Lord, who in these holy mysteries gives us a pledge of eternal life; and who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

A Reading from Exodus 12:1-14

Yahweh said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each thousehold. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lambshall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of Yahweh. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am Yahweh. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to Yahweh; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

THE HOLY GOSPEL OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO JOHN People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

13:1-17, 31b-35

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord--and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

"Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, `Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

THE WASHING OF THE FEET

Fellow servants of our Lord Jesus Christ: On the night before his death, Jesus set an example for his disciples by washing their feet, an act of humble service. He taught that strength and growth in the life of the Kingdom of God come not by power, authority, or even miracle, but by such lowly service. We all need to remember his example, but none stand more in need of this reminder than those whom the Lord has called to the ordained ministry.

Therefore, I invite you who share in the royal priesthood of Christ, to come forward, that I may recall whose servant I am by following the example of my Master. But come remembering his admonition that what will be done for you is also to be done by you to others, for "a servant is not greater than his master, nor is one who is sent greater than the one who sent him. If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them."



There will be multiple foot washing stations during the service. The clergy will kneel at some of the stations if you would like to have your feet washed. If you wish to wash the feet of someone you love, you may also come forward to the empty stations or a station with a clergy and the clergy will step aside. Please remove your shoes before coming forward.



Hearing God's word of promise, let us approach our Father in prayer by the confidence of his Holy Spirit:

And so we pray for our nation and those who lead it:

People That what you call justice, we may call justice. And how you make peace,

we may make peace.

Reader "God said, 'Let the earth produce vegetation. Let the water swarm with living

creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the expanse of the sky.' And God

saw that it was good." Gen. 1:11,20,25

And so we pray for our lands and seas, those who till them and those who fish them:

People That we may care, take, and eat with thanksgiving.

Reader Jesus said, "Do not work for food that perishes, but for the food that endures for

eternal life." John 6:27

And so we pray for daily life and work in this community:

People That whatever we do, we do it as if it were for the Lord.

Reader "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ ... who consoles us in all

our affliction, so that we may be able to console those who are in any affliction with

the consolation with which we oursleves are consoled by God." 2 Cor. 1:3-4

And so we pray for all who suffer and anyone in trouble: especially those on our

parish prayer list.

People That we may bear each other's burdens as Christ bore ours.

Reader Jesus said "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in Me, even if he

dies, will live. Everyone who lives and believes in me will never die – ever."

John 11:25-26

And so we pray for those who have died:

People That their life and ours might not end in death but resurrection.

The Celebrant adds a concluding Collect.



For our sins he was lifted high upon the cross, that he might draw the whole world to himself; and, by his suffering and death, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who put their trust in him.

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

Our Father, who art in heaven,
hallowed be thy Name,



At this time the lights are lowered and the congregation kneels.

Go to dark Gethsemane, ye that feel the tempter's power; your Redeemer's conflict see, watch with him one bitter hour; Turn not from his griefs away, learn of Jesus Christ to pray.

Follow to the judgment hall; view the Lord of life arraigned; O the wormwood and gall! O the pangs his souls sustained! Shun not suffering, shame, or loss; learn of him to bear the cross.

Calvary's mournful mountain climb; there, adoring at his feet, mark the miracle of time, God's own sacrifice complete; "It is finished!" hear him cry; learn of Jesus Christ to die.



THE STRIPPING OF THE ALTAR

In some church traditions all of the altar coverings and decorations are removed after the Eucharist. In the church's history the altar symbolizes the Christ, the "stripping of the altar" symbolizes the abandonment of Jesus by his disciples and the stripping of Jesus by the soldiers prior to his crucifixion. This represents the humiliation of Jesus and the consequences of sin as a preparation for the celebration of new life and hope that is to come on Resurrection Day.

DEPARTURE IN SILENCE

The silent exit is an important part of these services as it is an opportunity for each of us to meditate on Jesus' Passion and his great love and sacrifice for each of us. It also helps us see Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil as one continuous service.

It is difficult for some of us to not greet others at the end of the service, but please do leave in silence.

Please see below for other opportunities to continue your personal prayer time as Jesus did in the Garden of Gethsemane.

PRAYER VIGIL

We invite you to stay after service or choose a time to come back and pray with us as we will continue a Prayer Vigil throughout this night until noon on Good Friday.

LABYRINTH

Our outdoor labyrinth will be available to walk throughout the vigil and there will be 2 guided Labyrinth Walks on Good Friday. Labyrinth walking is an ancient practice used by many different faiths for spiritual centering, contemplation, and prayer. Entering the serpentine path of a labyrinth, walk slowly while quieting your mind and focusing on a spiritual question or prayer. More information will be available on the table near the Crossroads next to the doors to the labyrinth.



WHY IS TODAY CALLED MAUNDY THURSDAY?

"Maundy" comes from the Latin word "mandate", meaning, "commandment." Maundy Thursday marks the occasion of the Last Supper. Theologically, we remember two commandments given to us by Jesus. The first, centered on the Holy Eucharist, is "do this in remembrance of me," his words to the disciples at the Last Supper. The second, focusing on Jesus' actions at the Last Supper in the Gospel according to John, is his commandment to "love one another as I have loved you." We begin by washing one another's feet and close of the service by stripping of the altar. From the darkened church, the congregation departs in silence.

Thank you for worshiping with us today as part of our journey to Easter.
